HISTORY OF BABSON INSTITUTE

In September, 1919, the doors of Babson Institute were opened to the first group of students. They were twenty-six in number, coming to Wellesley Hills from thirteen states and Canada. During the four years of the Institute's life it has grown steadily in number of men enrolled, and has drawn these men from a territory constantly widening. In the year just finished fifty-three men representing twenty states and Canada have attended the Resident School.

President Coleman came to the Institute in 1921, following Mr. Linnekin, the Vice President by a year. Of the four instructors who have headed departments this year, Mr. Fittz has been with the Institute since its earliest days. Mr. Bamburgh and Mr. Millea joined the teaching staff in the middle of the academic year 1919-20, Mr. Matthews being added in the following June.

The physical setting for the Resident School's first year was Mr. Babson's former home on Abbott Road. The following year the school moved to the building on Washington Street, taking possession after the Babson Statistical Organization had departed for their present quarters. Early in 1922 the new Institute campus was purchased, and in the fall of that year construction was begun on the buildings for Resident and Extension Divisions. This new campus of two hundred acres affords unlimited opportunity for the future of Babson Institute. It is there that the school's activities will be continued during and after the academic year 1923-4.


